



ZIP IT
Keep your personal stuff private and think about what you say and do online.



BLOCK IT
Block people who send nasty messages and don't open unknown links and attachments.



FLAG IT
Flag up with someone you trust if anything upsets you or if someone asks to meet you offline.

NEED SOME HELP?

What should I do if my child needs help about something they have seen on the internet?

- Talk to your child and reassure them that they can always come to you if something upsets or worries them online.
- If you can, always save the evidence as it makes it easier to show exactly what has happened. It might be that you can make a report to the online service being used at the time. Evidence may include screen shots taken on a laptop or mobile device, emails, texts or online conversation histories.
- Depending on what has happened, it might be necessary to let us know at school too.

If you want to make a complaint about an advert, television or radio programme, film, newspaper, magazine, video game or other type of content online or offline, that you think is unsuitable for children, you can report it using **ParentPort**.

Many online sites such as Facebook, Skype and The PlayStation Network have useful help and advice areas. They also have ways to report cyberbullying and other things that are blocked on the sites. Check out your phone providers for tips and advice too.
